THEORIES OF PROPERTIES AND ONTOLOGICAL THEORY CHOICE:

The dissertation argues that we have no good reason to accept any one account of the nature of properties as true, because we lack any principled basis for choosing one theory of properties over its competitors. I present three possible bases for theory-choice in the properties debate: coherence, explanatory adequacy, and explanatory value. I then argue that each of these bases fails to resolve the underdetermination. I then propose an instrumentalist approach to dealing with the underdetermination of what theory of properties we should accept.
